Many positive and exciting things are happening in Sartell, and many volunteers and organizations continue to build the community spirit that is the trademark of Sartell. As we grow to nearly 18,000 people (nearly doubling the population since 2000), it is easy to understand why people love to work, play and volunteer in our great community!

### SARTELL VOLUNTEERS

The summer showed us again the beautiful results of volunteer efforts in the numerous gardens throughout Sartell. While this is the effort of many, I want to recognize Judy Pohlkamp, Kaye Wenker, Jessie Kovall and especially Dennis Molitor for the countless hours they contribute toward keeping this community beautiful. I would also like to thank the many volunteers helping to make Champion Field, Bernick's Arena and Pinecone Central Park such great places for our kids, community and the many visitors who enjoy activities in those facilities throughout the year. In addition, the countless community events that occur in Sartell during the summer months, including church festivals, the Apple Duathlon, Summerfest, Movies in the Park and the Sartell Chamber's Rock n' Block, to name a few, all do so much in creating a community which brings us all together. I am very thankful for the businesses and volunteers who help make it all happen.

### CITY INVESTMENTS

We all know how important public safety is to strong communities. The City is making increasing investments in public safety and streets, having focused our budgets in these areas over the past two years. In law enforcement, we approved and funded the hiring of three additional police officers as well as a community service officer. We have completed a number of street projects including significant improvements to Pinecone Road, and worked with Stearns County and MNDOT on improvements to County Rd 1, Hwy 15 and Heritage Drive. Proactively, we are increasing seal coating, overlays, and reconstructions to maintain and improve numerous streets over the next five years, including future reconstruction phases of Pinecone Road North leading to the new high school. We are working to make all of these improvements with solid decision making and with our tax base growth rather than big tax rate increases. We continue to be one of the fastest growing communities in our region. I am proud of Sartell and want to see us continue to balance growth with keeping our community safe and attractive.

## SARTELL COMMUNITY CENTER

We are incredibly excited to see the construction of the Sartell Community Center underway. The desire for a community center has been discussed for many years. With the approval of the half-cent sales tax extension in 2014, we finally have the funding source to make the dream a reality. We are building a space that is multi-purpose, multi-generational and meets community desires without duplicating regional amenities. The first phase includes three varsity size courts, striped for basketball, volleyball, and pickleball, with multipurpose flooring to accommodate any indoor sporting practice, potential trade shows or expos, concerts and more. Above the courts, there will be a multilane walking track with views to the outside. The community center will also include a senior center, multipurpose room that will function as a meeting or overflow space, concession area, an indoor play structure for smaller children, and a learning and innovation space. The learning and innovation space will be designed to have comfortable adult and children's spaces, with shelves of books and resources combined with wifi access, children's programming and story hours, and maker spaces designed for activities such as crafts or study sessions. We are currently working toward a smart, innovative partnership with Great River Regional Library to bring their services and the wealth of their collection to the community center which will increase convenience for Sartell residents in an affordable, common sense way. Outdoors, the center will have patios off the main corridor, senior center and learning and innovation space, with views of Lake Francis as well as a walking trail around the lake. As I mentioned, this is phase one of the community center. While our budget limits what we can accomplish in the first phase, we look forward to adding amenities in the future. Together with staff, our construction manager, and our architect, the council was careful to pick a site and layout that will accommodate future expansion and additional outdoor amenities like a possible outdoor pool, band shelter, warming house and more. We look forward to the grand opening in summer 2017.

It is my honor to serve as the Mayor of this City. I grew up in Sartell and my husband and I chose this great community as the place to raise our family. I look forward to working together to keep good things happening in Sartell!

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
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### CITY COUNCIL MEETING SCHEDULE

Permits will not be available at the compost site, and entrance will not be granted without a sticker.

**DIRECTIONS:** From Sartell City Hall, take Pinecone Road South to the four-way stop at the Heritage Drive and Pinecone Road Intersection. Take a right onto County Road 133 for about 2 miles to County Road 4. Take a right onto County Road 4, and the next right on 30th Avenue North. You will see the Sartell Compost Site on your right. A map to the compost site is available above.



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# Composite Site Rules & Regulations



1. You must be a Sartell resident. LeSauk Township and City of St. Cloud, Sauk Rapids, St. Joseph and Waite Park residents are also able to purchase non-resident compost permits for \$60.00. (\$61.00 if purchased online.) (Compost sticker required).
2. Commercial haulers and lawn service companies are not eligible to use this site.
3. You must register with supervisor on the site before entering compost site.
4. You must have a compost permit sticker attached to the inside bottom of the driver side windshield. Entrance to the compost site will not be allowed without a valid permit.
5. Only clean yard waste, brush and tree waste will be accepted.  
  
Acceptable yard waste includes leaves, grass clippings, pine cones, pumpkins, acorns, apples, and garden vegetation. Acceptable brush and tree waste includes shrubs, tree branches, and firewood.
6. The City reserves the right to limit the quantity of brush disposed.
7. Unacceptable yard waste includes construction wood, dimensional wood, pallets, stumps or whole tree logs. Yard waste mixed with rocks, metal, concrete, Styrofoam, animal feces, food scraps, or other foreign material is also unacceptable.
8. You must empty all bags used to transport compost material and put the empty bag(s) into a dumpster or recycle the bags. No plastic bags are to be left on site as they contaminate the compost.
9. Branches and yard waste must be separated.
10. All loads entering site must be covered to prevent loss of any waste while driving to the compost site.
11. After unloading, all trailers, pickup boxes, etc., must be swept clean.
12. The equivalent of one pickup load per week of finished compost by permit holders may be taken.
13. Residents caught purchasing permits for other than their own household vehicles will forfeit their permit(s) for the year and all monies paid.

**WHERE DO YOU VOTE?**

- **PRECINCT 1** - All residents who live east of Pinecone Road and south of 2nd Street South. The polling place is Sartell Public Utilities Building, 230 4 th Avenue South.
- **PRECINCT 2** - All residents who live on the east side of the Mississippi River (Benton County portion of Sartell). The polling place is in the Chapel at Country Manor, 520 1 st Street NE.
- **PRECINCT 3** - All residents who live east of Pinecone Road, North of 2 nd Street South, and south of 5 th Street North. The polling place is Messiah Lutheran Church, 320 4 th Avenue North.
- **PRECINCT 4** - All residents who live west of Pinecone Road, south of 2 1/2 St N and the portion south of 3rd Street North that lies west of 19th Ave North. The polling place is Sartell City Hall, 125 Pinecone Road North.
- **PRECINCT 5** - All residents who live east of Pinecone Road, north of 5th Street North and south of 12th Street North. The polling place is Sartell Middle School, in the south gym. Enter through the south door.

- **PRECINCT 6** - All residents who live east of Pinecone Road and north of 12th Street North. The polling place is Sartell Middle School, in the south gym. Enter through the south door.
- **PRECINCT 7** - All residents who live west of Pinecone Road, north of 2 1/2 St N, and that portion of 3rd Street North that lies west of 19th Ave N. The polling place is Celebration Lutheran Church, 1500 Pine Cone Road North.

## REGISTRATION INFORMATION

To avoid delays on election day, please prepare by doing the following:

- **Pre-register** – To do so you must submit a completed registration application to your county auditor’s office. Applications are available at city hall or from your County Auditors’ offices. The application must be received by your county auditor by 5 p.m. on October 18th.
- **Know where your polling place is located** – You will only be allowed to vote at the polling location for the precinct in which you reside.
- **Plan to vote in the late morning or early afternoon** – Most polling places see a significant increase in voters during the early morning hours (7 a.m. to 9 a.m.) and again in the evening (6 p.m. to 8 p.m.). To avoid the possibility of long lines, try to go to your polling place during the middle portion of the day. Minnesota Statutes 204C.04 Subdivision 1 states: “Every employee who is eligible to vote in an election has the right to be absent from work for the purpose of voting during the morning of the day of that election, without penalty or deduction from salary of wages because of the absence.”
- **Bring proper documentation** – If you fail to preregister, you will need to register at your polling place. Make certain that you have the appropriate identification and documentation with you when you arrive at the polls. For a complete list of the authorized proofs of residence go to **www.mnvotes.org**. ONLY the documents listed will be accepted by the election judges on election day.

## ABSENTEE VOTING

In Minnesota, you do not have to wait until election day to vote – you can vote early with an absentee ballot.

- **Vote Absentee** – Absentee voting will be available at your county auditor’s office. You may vote in person by visiting the auditor’s office during regular business hours, or if you prefer, you may have the ballot materials sent to you.

The city only has applications for absentee ballots which you can pick up, fill out and either take with you to the county to vote in person, or mail to the county requesting your ballot be mailed to you. Go to **www.mnvotes.org** for more information on absentee voting. Each county will offer extended hours to conduct additional absentee voting at their offices on Saturday, November 5th from 10 a.m. until 3 p.m., and again on Monday, November 7th until 5 p.m. The phone numbers for the counties Sartell is in are shown below:

## WHAT ARE THE MOST COMMON ORDINANCE VIOLATIONS?

The City of Sartell continues its residential and commercial growth. With this growth come new members to our community who may be unaware of certain city ordinances that they need to comply with. Even residents who have lived in the community for many years may not be aware of certain ordinances until a police officer shows up at their door. Although we do encourage neighbors to work together to resolve issues, sometimes it becomes necessary to have a police officer act as the facilitator to resolve the problem.

We would like to inform you of some of the most common ordinance violations that we receive calls on. This will hopefully help us all to understand local laws better and make our community a better and more neighborly place to live.

**Burning of leaves (chapter 4-2):** burning of leaves is prohibited with no exceptions.

**Recreational fire (chapter 4-2):** no larger than 3'x3'; must be attended at all times with water close for extinguishing.

**72 hour parking (chapter 6-2):** no motor vehicle, trailer or camper shall be parked or left standing for more than seventy two (72) consecutive hours on any public street, avenue or thoroughfare within the corporate limits of the City.

## SNOW PLOWING

The City will provide reasonable ice and snow control such control in a safe and cost-effective manner; keeping in mind safety, budget, personnel and environmental concerns.

### WHEN WILL THE CITY START SNOW OR ICE CONTROL OPERATIONS?

- Snow accumulation of 3 inches (not a minimum) or more
- Drifting of snow that causes problems for travel
- Icy conditions which seriously affect travel
- Time of snowfall in relationship to heavy use of streets.



Snow and ice control operations are expensive and involve the use of limited personnel and equipment. Snowplowing operations will not generally be conducted for snowfall of fewer than 3 inches.

### Priorities and Schedule for Which Streets Will be Plowed

The City has classified streets based on the street function, traffic volume and importance to the welfare of the community. Major roadways such as Pinecone Road and 2 1/2 Street North will be plowed first because they carry a high volume of vehicles, they connect major sections of the city and provide access for emergency, fire, police and medical services.

The second priority streets are those streets providing access to schools and commercial businesses, residential streets, alleys, and cul-de-sacs.

### SIDEWALKS - BIKE PATHS

The city will remove snow from some of the sidewalks and bike paths in the city. The list of those sidewalks and bike paths can be received from the Public Works Department by calling 258-7339. As there are a limited number of personnel available, the city will only remove snow from these sidewalks/bike paths as time allows. Due to the use of different staff and equipment in plowing streets versus trails, snow removal from trails may start while street plowing is still occurring. Streets are our top priority for snow removal. All of our plows can be out and different equipment can be used on trails and sidewalks.

**Public nuisance (chapter 4-6):** inoperable and/or unregistered vehicles or trailers on private property; refuse or debris accumulation; loud noise between 11:00 pm and 7:00 am; any device, machine, instrument, radio, sound or music amplification device in such a manner as to be plainly audible or physically felt at the property line of the structure or building in which it is located, in the hallway or apartment adjacent, or at a distance of 50 feet if the source is located outside a structure or building at any time of day.

**Animals (chapter 5-2):** dogs need to be leashed when on public property or on streets; habitual barking; allowing animal to defecate on public or private property without immediately removing the excrement and disposing of it in a sanitary manner. Dogs older than 6 months of age must be licensed with the city.

In the event of a fire emergency during the winter, could firefighters find the hydrant near your home? Or does it get buried under a snow pile? The city encourages residents to “adopt a fire hydrant” near their home and keep snow shoveled away from it during the winter season. This will ensure hydrants are visible and will greatly speed the response time in case of an emergency. Please don’t let your neighborhood hydrant remain “under cover”.

## KEEP YOUR SIDEWALK CLEAR OF SNOW AND ICE

Sartell ordinances require property owners to clear public sidewalks in front of your home or businesses of snow and ice within 24 hours after the end of a snowfall. This is necessary to ensure the safety of people using the sidewalks.

- Shovel the full width of the sidewalk on all sides of your property.
- Remove ice to bare pavement. Treat with salt or sand, if needed.
- If you have corner property, clear curb cuts at corners and crosswalks to the street gutter to facilitate handicap accessibility.
- Pile snow into your yard and boulevard. It is against the law to shovel snow into the street or alley.
- Make arrangements for someone to take over while you are away.



Failure to comply may result in snow and ice removal by the City. Property owners will be billed for this service.

## WINTER PARKING

The city has an ordinance which prohibits the parking of any vehicle on any street or alleyway within the city, during the months of November through March between the hours of 1:00 a.m. and 7:00 a.m. Vehicles in violation are ticketed and towed at the owner's expense.

**WHAT DO I DO WITH MY FALL LAWN CLIPPINGS AND YARD WASTE?**

The City does not allow you to burn yard waste (or other debris), and it is illegal to throw clippings into wetlands, ditches, ponds or onto vacant or City owned property. A compost site is provided for City residents. To find out costs and more information, please turn to pages 8-9.

**WHERE ARE THE SKATING AND HOCKEY RINKS?**

Weather permitting, there is free skating at Val Smith Park (corner of 1st St NE and 4th Ave E) and the outdoor pleasure rink at the Pinecone Regional Park (Along Pinecone Road North and 1st St S). The Warming Houses are open (weather permitting) on school days from 4:00 p.m. - 9:00 p.m. and on non-school days from 1:00 p.m. - 9:00 p.m. The rinks will be open for the season as Mother Nature allows. We will post opening and closing dates on our community sign along Pinecone Road South and this website.
